Green Oak Station

Traveling north from Ann Arbor in Washtenaw County, to Pontiac in Oakland County, c. 1840, one followed the north-south trail in Green Oak Township along the centerlines of sections 35, 26, 23, 14, and 11, to Silver Lake Road. (This portion of the trail was later named Rushton Road.) One then continued East on Silver Lake Road to the Pontiac Trail in Oakland County. Research indicates these road names became official following the Detroit Edison bringing power to Green Oak in the early 1930s. However, everyone knew who lived on which road and which trail to follow.

In 1833, Reverend Ira Olds arrived in Michigan to serve the Presbyterian church of South Lyon. His wife, Jane and son, Alonzo were with him. Shortly after arrival Ira and Jane bought 80 acres May 23, 1834, selling to Alonzo late that year. Alonzo also bought 40 acres nearby. Within a few years both men bought several acres in section 26, in the area of Ten Mile Road and the trail.

Alonzo married Janet Warden, a niece of Kinsley Bingham, who lived a few miles north. They had two children: Mary a. b. 1843 and Robert b. 1846. Alonzo built a saw mill on the creek and before long a substantial home on the west side of the trail. (This house still stands, but is not open to the public.)

Alonzo did not neglect his civic responsibilities even in that primitive environment. In 1833, the Federal government planned a turnpike along the already well traveled trail west from Detroit, the Grand River Trail. The turnpike would follow that trail through Farmington, Novi, New Hudson, Kensington, Brighton, and beyond. Kinsley Bingham became aware of a change promoted by communities south, to route the trail through a more southerly route. He speedily prepared a petition, for local settlers to sign, to proper officials. Alonzo was among those who eagerly signed the successful petition.

The record states Alonzo owned, by 1859, over 600 acres in section 11, at the point where Silver Lake Road and Rushton Road intersect. (Rushton Road terminated at Grand River Road at that time.) At that intersection he built Green Oak Station. A general store, blacksmith, post office, and other small businesses were built, including his saw mill. The 1860 census shows seven employees on the site. Alonzo built another fine two-story frame house on the west side of Rushton Road. This became known as the Green Oak Inn. To be continued.
