WE SEND OUR HEARTFELT SYMPATHY TO MARIEANNA BAIR AND THE FAMILY ON THE PASSING OF HER HUSBAND EARLAND BERT BAIR ON JUNE 3, 2015.

(Please see the article Marieanna wrote about “The Huron River Stock Farm”.) Bert was born on September 9, 1925. During the Great Depression, Charley Emmett and Mabel Olson Mayfield Bair brought their family from Jasper, Missouri to Hamburg, Michigan where Emmett found employment. Bert and his brothers, Charles and Roland, attended Hollister Rural School. After graduating from Brighton High School in 1943, Bert served in the Navy from 1943 to 1946 during World War II. Bert married Marieanna Seitz on July 11, 1946. Bert and Marieanna purchased their present home in 1960. Bert was an engineer employed by Chevrolet Division at the General Motors Proving Ground for 34 years, retiring in 1980.

Bert enjoyed fishing with his family, growing healthy food, and hunting. He was a quiet gentleman, who put others’ needs ahead of his own.

Whenever Edna Peach, the founder of the historical society needed extra help, she called on Bert. Cleo Moran remembers Bert as the quiet gentleman who mowed the grass at the Gage House when it was used as the GOTHS museum. Many of us will think of Bert when we have chicken noodle soup as he made it so often for the GOTHS potluck dinners. It was delicious! Bert was a former trustee of our society. He donated his time to GOTHS, the Brighton Area Historical Society, American Legion Post #235 and St. George Lutheran Church. Bert was preceded in death by his parents; brother Charles and half-brother, Robert. Bert leaves to cherish his memory his wife,

Marieanna Bair and their five children: David (Judy), Tony, Paul (Kathy), Roxann (Larry) DeWulf, and Kristal (Gary) Unger, 13 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren. (The family plans to hold a memorial service for Bert at a later date.)



Huron River Stock Farm

Around 1900 the publishers of the Brighton Argus encouraged area farmers to give their farms a name identifying their unique location, their agricultural pursuits, their business, and/or their background. This would be the logo on their business stationery which could be ordered from the Brighton Argus. Many farmers liked the idea of promoting their identity in this manner.

One of them was Mary Christa. Her 250 acre farm was on the Grand River Trail at the north end of Green Oak Township, east of Pleasant Valley Road.

The original owner of the property was William S. Russell who received a land patent from the Federal government in 1833. The Grand River Trail passed through the north end of the property. With the building of the Plank Road in 1850, a toll gate was located just east of Pleasant Valley Road. William's brother, Elihu, tended the toll gate collecting varying amounts for animals, buggies, wagons, and travelers, using the newly planked road.

With the passing of William in 1870, members of the Christa family from

Detroit purchased the property, building a two story, four square house. Owners of a marble concern, the Christas used much of that material in the house. A very modern house for the time, it had the first furnace (a huge monster) with steam radiators in the area. A marble-lined bathroom, with tub, had an outside entrance for use by farm workers; an inlaid marble-floored front entry, a marble stairway and a shallow marble-fronted fire place. The white marble baseboards provided convincing evidence that the Christas constructed the house. Built-in closets were another unusual feature. Mary Christa, niece of Phillip Christa ran the Huron River Stock Farm very efficiently. Large barns and other outbuildings were east of the house (prevailing winds from the west). A large apple orchard of about 36 to 40 trees were planted south of the house. With fields under cultivation one surely could view the Huron River as it flowed through the south half of the farm.

In 1923, Mary signed a right-of-way for a highway realignment of M 16 (Grand River) when the highway was paved in 1924. This eliminated a

dangerous sharp turn at Woodruff Creek east of the house. (Early drivers were not immune to the challenge, "Just how fast can this Lizzie go?")

Upon Mary's death, her nephew, Milton, was responsible for the property. By 1960, when this writer acquired the house and most of the land (which hadn't been purchased by the state for the recreation area) was owned by the Brighton Development Corporation. It didn't take long for the barns to be replaced by industries. 




